Call to Order

Chair Andy Ferrari and Commissioner Judy Craig had not arrived to the meeting by 4:00 p.m.

Secretary Kathie Shepard established that there was a quorum with Commissioner Girtman, Commissioner Guzman and herself present and proceeded to call the meeting to order. The meeting took place at DeLand City Hall in the Commission Chamber, located at 120 S. Florida Ave., DeLand, Florida, having been legally noticed in the Daytona Beach News-Journal, a newspaper of general circulation in Volusia County.

Approval of Proposed Agenda

Motion 057 – 2018 Commissioner Girtman motioned to approve the agenda. Commissioner Guzman seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by Commissioners Girtman, Commissioner Guzman and Commissioner Shepard.

Discussion Items

Millage Rate – presentation attached
UMR 2017-2018 Budget Forecast
Funding Applications and amounts requested
CAC Member Elmer Holt response to Board inquiry re: Budget restrictions (email dated June 28, 2018 attached)

Mr. Ron Cantlay reviewed the rolled-back millage rate presentation at different HealthCard enrollment levels. Mr. Cantlay stressed to the Commissioners that there really are not enough funds in reserves and any unexpended funds can aide in building that long-term funds reserve.

4:09 p.m. Commissioner Guzman announced that she received a message from Chair Ferrari and that he was in the emergency department at Florida Hospital DeLand and would not be in attendance for tonight's meetings.

4:15 p.m. Commissioner Judy Craig arrived to the meeting. Commissioner Shepard passed the gavel to Vice-Chair Craig.

There was much Board discussion and consent to consider establishing a millage rate slightly higher than the rolled-back rate, with the hope of ultimately adopting the rolled-back rate. Further, there was Board discussion and consent to hold funding at last year's funding limits or closer to last year's funding limits rather than implementing any increases in funding.

CAC Member Elmer Holt addressed the Board explaining that it was a real struggle to assess and make funding recommendations for the WVHA applications for funding, where roughly 4 agencies requested funding increases from 40% up to 120%.

Vice-Chair Craig stated that she was opposed to adopting anything higher than the rolled-back rate.

Commissioner Comments

There was further Board discussion and recommendation that the WVHA funded agencies who rely entirely on WVHA funding need to try and find other sources of funding in addition to the WVHA.

Mr. Cantlay reminded the Board that if they adopted a rate higher than the rolled-back rate it will be published as a preliminary tax increase.

The Board reconsidered and consented that they would adopt the rolled-back rate and keep funding levels at or near the levels of funding during fiscal year 2017-2018.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned.

Mr. Jacobs continued by reminding the Board that UMR recommended stalling the implementation of the newly Board approved increased copayment amounts until the beginning of the WVHA new fiscal year on October 1, 2018. He stated that UMR would gladly mail out those notifications; however, UMR wanted the content of that communication to come from the WVHA Board.

She asked the Board if NEFHS could adjust their request for funding to reduce the primary care fee for service rate and asked how the Board would like for NEFHS to proceed with this, in an attempt to be a good partner and as concerned tax payers.

There was Board consent, gratitude and direction that Ms. Asbury should edit the original NEFHS WVHA Application for Funding and deliver it to DRT in time for the next Board Meeting of August 16, 2018.

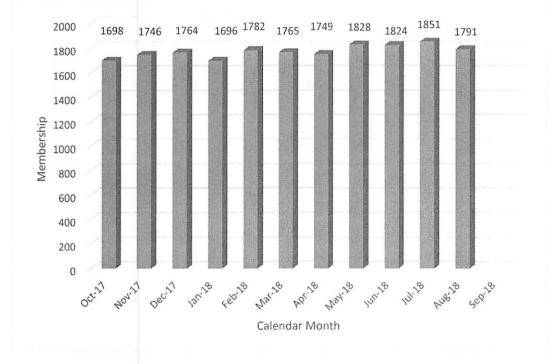

WVHA Health Card Program Eligibility – by Calendar Month – as of August 1, 2018

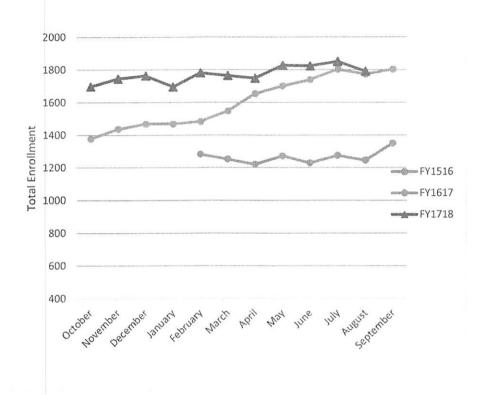

Building Healthier Communities One Person At A Time! All Hispanic Health Initiatives, Inc. (HHI) programs are aimed at creating meaningful opportunities for medically underserved individuals and families to learn, begin to advocate for and connect to health information and services leading to timely and early detection of chronic diseases they are known to be at high risk of. HHI creates access to health care by conveniently bringing information and services directly into the community, that is places where they live, work, play and worship. With the help of HHI's programs, many clients immediately and unexpectedly, discover and begin to address a chronic disease such as diabetes, and often in its early stages while the avoidable health problem can still be prevented or controlled. HHI's prevention programs promote and encourage making lifestyle changes that include weight loss, increasing physical activity and diet changes leading to the reduction of the risk for chronic disease. Ultimately, HHI accomplishes the triple aim of reducing costs, improving health and improving the quality of life.

Background and Program Description:

Since 2000, HHI's service model has been distinguished by the use of paraprofessional bilingual Community Health Workers (CHW). The utilization of bilingual CHWs has been recognized as a best practice for improving access to health care among uninsured families, especially the working poor.

HHI has developed several programs to promote wellness and improve health indicators among medically underserved adults by providing community based, culturally- and linguistically competent chronic disease health screening and education. As part of the West Volusia Hospital Authority grant HHI provides eligible West Volusia residents with FREE chronic disease health screening and education intended to bring awareness to clients current health status and improve their health risk profiles as determined by weight body mass index (B.M.I.), blood glucose, A1C, blood pressure, and cholesterol.

Activities:

Direct service activities implemented under the program are:

1. "Cuidando Mi Salud/Taking Care of My Health" Health Risk Assessment (HRA):

The assessment consists of biological and behavioral screening for risks of metabolic (diabetes) and cardiovascular disease. Measures include B.M.I., blood glucose, blood pressure, cholesterol, and a personal and familial health history. Results of the biometrics and health histories are discussed in a one-on-one coaching session by HHI's CHW. In addition, each participant receives behavioral education using evidence based curricula and strategies for those whose show increased risk for chronic disease. Behavioral education focuses on healthy nutrition, regular physical activity, prevention and self-management of chronic disease such as diabetes and cardiovascular disease. The coaching and behavioral education includes recommendations for ongoing primary and/or behavioral health care as indicated by the screening outcomes. The client formulates a healthier lifestyle action plan with the help of the CHW and HHI provides behavioral modification tools in the form of measuring cups, food portion plates and exercise resistance bands to use in their strategy for the prevention or self-management of chronic disease.

The HRA goals are to create for the individual an awareness of lifestyle related risk factors for chronic disease and to engage those high-risk individuals in behavioral modifications known to improve clinical outcomes related to chronic disease progression.

Outcomes & Achievements:

The HHI/WVHA contract began in October 2017 and as of July 31, 2018, program outcomes are as follows:

- > 134 "Cuidando Mi Salud/Taking Care of My Health" HRA sessions held (Oct. 2017 July 2018)
- ➤ 690 clients, averaging 63.5 clients per month were served through the program not all were billable under the guidelines of the WVHA contract.
- > 553 clients screened clients for Blood Pressure, B.M.I., Cholesterol, Glucose and/or A1C were billed under the guidelines of the WVHA contract.
- ➤ 282 clients billed under the guidelines of the WVHA contract, received health and behavioral education using evidence based curricula and strategies focused on nutrition, regular physical activity, prevention and self-management of chronic disease.
- > 82 HRA clients billed under the guidelines of the WVHA contract, received direct case management including additional CHW's support for the behavioral education, contacting and collaborating with relevant health care providers, providing immediate referrals to appropriate health care providers, connecting with WVHA's Health Card prescreening enrollment service providers and other medical and/or social services needed.
- > 307 clients were referred to WVHA's Health Card prescreening enrollment service providers and appropriate health care providers (NEFHS) for primary care services
- ➤ 282 clients billed under the guidelines of the WVHA contract, received healthier lifestyle tool kits consisting of a portion control plate, measuring cups and spoons and a exercise resistance band. (approx. value \$10 each)

Additional client outcomes obtained through screening and health and behavioral education:

- Increased knowledge and awareness of their current health status related to chronic disease for at -risk adults
- Increased knowledge and awareness of healthier lifestyle options related to chronic disease for at -risk adults
- Increased knowledge and awareness of prevention and self-management techniques related to chronic disease conditions for at -risk adults

The need for intervention early on for people at risk for chronic disease incorporates both clinical and financial benefits, for them, as well as the community they live in. Studies have shown that making lifestyle changes that include losing weight, increasing physical activity and changing

one's diet can greatly reduce the risk for chronic disease. Many of the outcomes listed above are associated with positive and healthy lifestyle changes because of the interventions clients received through HHI, giving the West Volusia residents who accessed HHI's programs, the ability and tools needed in the prevention or control of chronic disease.

Program Value/Savings:

A 2017 public health data brief (figure 4), published by the Volusia county DOH, outlined diabetic emergency room visits, in the year 2016, for northwest and southwest Volusia residents. The results were 5748 individual visits totaling \$69,230,198 dollars (averaging \$8,200 per visit).

HHI's programs intervene with behavioral education using evidence based curricula and strategies focused on nutrition, regular physical activity, for the prevention and self-management of chronic disease for at risk adults either before, in the early stages of or diagnosed. The positive health outcomes HHI's clients have achieved, as outlined above, are proof that HHI's programs are a cost saving alternative that helps address uncontrolled chronic disease. Every client HHI connects to healthier lifestyle practices has the greater potential for the prevention and/or control of costly chronic disease, which potential creates an opportunity for enormous savings for both the client and the community they live in.

Lessons Learned:

First, on behalf of Hispanic Health Initiatives' Board, staff and volunteers, we commend the WVHA Board and Citizens Advisory Committee for having the interest, foresight and understanding to take a proactive approach to the wellbeing and health of West Volusia residents.

Successes:

- As outlined in figure 3 above high percentages of clients, who adhered to what they learned, have lowered their risk factors for uncontrolled chronic disease as a result of HHI's chronic disease prevention and self-management program.
- HHI has continued to build collaborative partnerships with various grassroots organizations, businesses and governmental agencies leading to an improvement in the delivery of health and human services for West Volusia's medically disadvantaged residents directly in their community. HHI's outreach sites include, among others, churches, food pantries, libraries and partner agency locations. These relationships will continue to help HHI and others to bring much needed health and human services directly into the community.
- HHI and several other WVHA grantees have formed a coalition The West Volusia Collaborative.

Challenges:

- There is a misconception that HHI provides duplicate services related to its chronic disease screening and education programs.
 - o Through a search for diabetes education services online via various reputable sites such as American Association of Diabetes Educators, American Diabetes Association and United Way 211, there were only two programs, other than HHI, found in the West Volusia area. Of those two one charges for its services, one is only for its health plan members and two are not presented in the spanish language.
 - Florida Hospital Deland Diabetes Education Program criteria: insurance or self-pay and not presented in spanish.
 - FL Healthcare Plan FCHP members only
 - o A search for affordable chronic disease screening only produced one other program other than HHI and there is a cost involved with it.
 - Florida Hospital Fish Memorial Cholesterol \$7, Glucose & Cholesterol \$12, Glucose & Glycohemoglobin A1C \$20. In addition this lab is open one Tuesday a month from 7 9 a.m.
- Another misconception conveyed to HHI, is that the chronic disease services HHI provides to the community are not life or cost saving.
 - o The CDC estimates that Chronic diseases—such as heart disease, cancer, chronic lung diseases, stroke, and type 2 diabetes—account for most deaths in the United States and globally. They are the major causes of sickness, disability, and health care costs in the nation. Chronic diseases are responsible for 7 in 10 deaths among Americans each year, and the vast majority of health care costs.
- The WVHA's 2017-2018 funding of HHI's program at only 39% has forced the program to limit services available to the community, lose trained staff because of the ability to only offer part-time work and the ability to pay staff a fair wage.
- Finding additional funding outside of the WVHA grant has posed a challenge for HHI. Since October 2017, HHI has submitted at least 12 funding applications to other funding sources such as Federal Dept. of Health and Human Services-Office of Minority Health, State of FL DOH-Office of Minority Health, FL Blue Foundation, Hispanic Federation and AstraZeneca. To date none have been funded.

Recommendations:

The WVHA Board should consider funding HHI's 2018-2019 application at 100%. Studies have shown the return on investment (ROI) for chronic disease prevention and self-management programs range from \$3 to \$5 dollars or more for every \$1 dollar invested.

HHI has over 18 years' experience, successfully educating, advocating for and connecting, thousands of central Florida's medically underserved residents to public health and human services. The organization has successfully managed several multi- year Federal, State and foundation grants totaling in the millions of dollars. HHI stands ready to help the WVHA Board in any capacity they see fit.

Letting this valuable program shut down, with a strong possibility of not opening again, is a disservice to the West Volusia Residents for whom both HHI and you the WVHA commissioners have pledged to serve.

Penalizing the program because third party funding to supplant the WVHA funding has not been established, is a mistake. To date HHI has submitted more than 10 grant applications throughout the 2017-2018 program year, to third party funding sources, in an attempt to procure monies outside of the WVHA funding. Regrettably, to date, none have been funded.

We renew our request for additional funds in order to continue servicing the community in need.

This letter is provided in reference to our 2017-2018 Funding Agreement for the Deltona Family Services Coordinator under the Prenatal, Post Partum and Infant Access to Health Care Services.

On January 5, 2018, we submitted a letter requesting reimbursement for funds that exceeded the quarterly funding limit. On January 18, 2018, we withdrew the request and determined that if, in future months, we exceeded the amount, we could invoice for it if the total was less than our submitted annual budget and allocation by the Authority.

Our Finance Director spoke with Eileen (Ms. Long) and she explained that the letter we sent indicated that we would not request funds that exceed EACH quarterly amount and then in totality and then further clarified the language in the contract. We apparently misinterpreted this information and I apologize if my correspondence was also not clear.

Therefore, I would like to formally request that we be allowed to invoice for funds that exceed the final quarterly amount and/or Quarter 1 if they are within our annual budget amount and units worked during the year. We function under an annual budget and would like to ensure we do not experience a significant deficit.
